SE Uplift Executive Committee Minutes
Wednesday, June 17, 2015, 4:30 PM @ SE Uplift (3534 SE Main St)

- **Quorum confirmed**

- **Land Use & Transportation Committee**
 - At last board meeting, board approved new LUTC guidelines and appointed Jeff Cole as a co-chair of the LUTC.
 - Section 6a: *The committee must have co-chairs. One of the co-chairs is to be appointed by the Board. The other co-chair is to be elected by the committee.*
 - Subsequently to the June SE Uplift Board Meeting, Sunnyside had their board elections and voted Reuben Deumlings as their SE Uplift Board Rep and Dan Rutzick as their SE Uplift Land Use & Transportation Committee Representative.
 - The issue is that LUTC guidelines state, “The co-chairs are considered the voting representative from their respective Neighborhood Associations.” (Section 4c). This means that as the guidelines are currently written, the SE Uplift Board would be replacing Sunnyside’s elected representative with Jeff Cole.
 - A second issue is that the one of the SE Uplift board members attending the LUTC meetings, Michael Molinaro, is not a committee member, since the guidelines don’t currently allow for at-large members. This means that the committee currently doesn’t have the two SE Uplift board members needed for it to have executive authority.
 - Section 4a: *Eligibility: Each Neighborhood Association within the coalition will be allowed one voting member on the committee.*
 - Section 3c: *A minimum of two Board Directors must be members of the committee and present at the meeting in order for the committee to exercise executive authority.*
 - It was decided that there would be a conversation about these issues at the July board meeting and that Bob would bring a summary of where things stand and what the options are moving forward.

- **SE Uplift representative on the Portland Parks & Recreation Budget Advisory Committee**
 - Scott motioned to reappoint Amy Lewin as SE Uplift’s representative to the Portland Parks & Recreation Budget Advisory Committee.
 - Don seconded.
 - **Motion passed unanimously.**
 - Anne noted that she would let Amy know and request that she provide formal reports back to the board.

- **Knock-Knock Proposal**
 - Ashe noted that her proposal for Knock-Knock to leave SE Uplift needed to be run by an attorney.

- **Foster Powell Neighborhood Association Fiscal Sponsorship Application**
 - Don motioned to renew Foster Powell’s three fiscal sponsorship accounts (general, FoPo garden tour, and National Night Out) with SE Uplift.
 - Scott seconded.
 - **Motion passed unanimously.**

- **Bylaw Committee**
 - Board appointed Don, Moshe, and Marianne C to bylaw committee at June meeting.
 - Committee requested clarity on what the issues are with SE Uplift's current bylaws.
 - The following potential issues were mentioned:
 - Executive committee powers vs. subcommittee powers
 - Ambiguity on if can have both an additional NA representative from the same neighborhood as the president.
 - Need to specify that the 5 directions from SEUL-area community organizations... are non-NA members.
 - Grievance procedure
 - Reference to ONI Standards
 - Notice for committee meetings

- **Recode Fiscal Sponsorship Account**
 - Original application said they would be working directly with neighborhood associations w/in coalition. The actual project has not done this and does not fit our mission.
 - Recode was told that they needed to have different fiscal sponsor or 501(c)3 status by August 3rd, 2015.
 - It appears that they are unlikely to be able to meet this deadline.
 - They have also indicated that they would like to apply for numerous grants. We have indicated that we will not sign-off on any additional grants while they are under our fiscal sponsorship.
 - Executive Committee will discuss at their July 15th meeting and determine what to do if they don't meet August 3rd deadline.

- **Right 2 Dream Too**
 - Debbie Kitchen from the Central Eastside Industrial Council has indicated that they will be making an advocacy request of SE Uplift to support their letter asking for a public process to determine whether outdoor camps should be allowed under the current zoning code.
 - It was noted that neither HAND or Brooklyn have taken this position on the issue and therefore the request does not follow our advocacy process and potential conflicts with our mission to "assist... neighborhood associations of Southeast Portland..."
 - Board will discuss at July meeting.

- **Vision Zero Committee**
 - Robert noted that he plans to ask the SE Uplift board at the July meeting to send a letter to the Mayor asking that SE Uplift have a representative on the Vision Zero Safety Committee. Robert indicated that he would like to nominate Reuben as our representative.

- **Demolition Update**
 - The first [appeal hearing](#) (under the new requirements) to request a 60 day demolition delay will be next Wednesday at 1:30 and will be for an Eastmoreland Neighborhood Association appeal.

RE: Removal of Director

Dear Anne:

The Southeast Uplift Board of Directors has requested that I issue a legal opinion related to the removal of a director who represents the Sunnyside neighborhood from the Southeast Uplift Board of Directors. You provided me with Southeast Uplift's Articles and Amendment dated February 1, 1980, which I understand are your complete Articles as amended; bylaws; and page 1 of the Grant Agreement with the City of Portland. Article V, Section 2 of your bylaws state that the board "shall select" directors for open positions from those whose names have been presented to it. In effect, the board elects its own directors from a list given to it. Article V, Section 6 on removal states that a director may be removed with or without cause by a 2/3 vote of the directors in office. I understand that the Grant Agreement requires that each neighborhood association elect a neighborhood representative to the board. (Technically, the Oregon statute considers this an "appointed" director.) Your bylaws are not in compliance with this Grant Agreement provision, although I understand that you have followed ONI's requirement in practice by electing the directors named by the neighborhood associations.

Southeast Uplift is required by state law to follow its bylaws. Funder requirements do not overrule bylaws. The bylaws provide that the board elects its own directors and that a director can only be removed by a vote of 2/3 of the directors in office after the notice required in Article V, Section 6.

Because you accept ONI funding, your bylaws should be in compliance with your funding requirements so that you don't jeopardize your funding. I would recommend that you amend your bylaws as soon as possible to ensure compliance. You may also want to ascertain whether ONI rules allow Southeast Uplift to remove a director appointed by a neighborhood association and ensure that your amended bylaws comply with ONI's rule.

Dear Mr. McCullough,

On behalf of the Board of Directors of the Central Eastside Industrial Council, I would like to thank you and the board members of SE Uplift for your willingness to listen to the concerns of our members about the proposed relocation of a tent camp to the Central Eastside. We have a number of concerns and believe the City should embark on a process to have an open and broad discussion of the issues raised by this proposed action. We would like to ask for your support in advocating for an open and broadly participatory public process to determine as a community whether outdoor camps should be allowed under the current zoning code.

Houselessness is a pressing humanitarian issue, especially in our community where there are many needs and limited resources. All of us agree that something needs to be done but there does not seem to be widespread consensus on what should be done. Our City has been built by intense regulatory scrutiny of the urban environment, rigorous design review, and a commitment to a compelling pedestrian realm. All of these things have been accomplished through valid planning processes where the experts, the public, the planners and the community have come together, debated the regulations, the goals and the vision and arrived at a collective plan for our City. We are all participants in developing that vision for our community.

In this case, City officials have proposed to relocate a tent camp without our standard public process, even if that action undermines the legitimacy of the Portland City Code. It is possible, and has been contemplated, that additional tent camps would be located in more than one location in our community. We respectfully request that SE Uplift join the Central Eastside Industrial Council in calling for an open public process to determine if tent camps should be allowed and promoted as an appropriate response to our need for housing in Portland.

Thank you for your consideration. Please feel free to call upon me for additional clarification and discussion.

With City Council set to consider Vision Zero goal, Portland takes action to improve transportation safety for everyone

(June 16, 2015) The City of Portland is poised to make major strides in implementing a Vision Zero transportation safety goal this week, including City Council policy actions, potential new speed control authority and a new driver safety pledge intended to help all Portlanders travel more safely.

Mayor Hales and Commissioner Steve Novick will announce on Wednesday that they have taken a Vision Zero pledge to support the global campaign to end traffic fatalities and serious injuries. They are calling on their Council colleagues to join them in adopting Vision Zero for the entire City government and in so doing are encouraging all City employees to sign on to contribute to a safer, healthier Portland.

"I am very pleased that the City Council will consider several important steps that will lead our actions on Vision Zero and reinforce recent investments that will make our multimodal transportation system safer for everyone," Transportation Director Leah Treat said. "This will further enhance the safety work we have under way across the City, including the actions I laid out in Portland Progress, PBOT's two-year action plan."

The Portland City Council on Wednesday will consider a resolution endorsing Vision Zero as the City's policy and direct PBOT to form a committee to advise on Vision Zero with diverse areas of expertise, including law enforcement, education, public health and emergency response.

City Council will also consider accepting a \$150,000 grant from the Oregon Department of Transportation to develop the Vision Zero Transportation Safety Action Plan. The plan will undertake a one-year effort, informed by traffic crash data, to generate specific policy recommendations and actions to reach Vision Zero by 2025. Both items are scheduled for 10:45 a.m. at the Council meeting.

Recent and upcoming actions to improve transportation safety and implement Vision Zero include:



The Portland Bureau of Transportation fully complies with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the ADA Title II, and related statutes and regulations in all programs and activities. - In East Portland, PBOT plans to install 24 rapid flash beacons in 2015, more than double the 20 beacons operational there as of 2014.
- On Wednesday afternoon, PBOT officials will seek permission from the Oregon Speed Zone Board to expedite the process for setting speeds on city streets, taking into account how and when pedestrians and cyclists use the road. While that request is pending, the City recently successfully reduced speeds on SE Division and Burnside, which are both classified as High Crash Corridors.
- PBOT has been supporting House Bill 2621, which would allow Portland to install fixed photo radar safety cameras to reduce speeding on the City's High Crash Corridors. The 10 designated High Crash Corridors make up just 3 percent of the City's road network, but they account for more than 50 percent of pedestrian fatalities in Portland. The bill is scheduled for a hearing on Wednesday at 1 p.m. in Room H-174 of the State Capitol Building in Salem.
- The City Council recently approved the City's biggest investment in the High Crash Corridor Program. The 2015-16 Budget approved on May 27 includes \$8 million for maintenance and safety improvements on 122nd Avenue in East Portland and \$2.8 million for safety improvements on East and West Burnside.
- The budget also includes \$300,000 to begin to expand Portland's Safe Routes to School programs to middle and high schools. Council adoption of the 2015-16 Budget is scheduled for Thursday.
- PBOT recently launched a new web site, VisionZeroPortland.com, which includes the Vision Zero Crash Map, an interactive map that displays 10 years of injury and fatality data for people walking, biking and driving. It also includes maps showing locations of existing and funded East Portland rapid flash beacons. On Wednesday, it will include the Vision Zero Pledge, so all Portlanders can sign on.
